

Charles "Chuck" Eldon Fleming

Charles Eldon Fleming, Jr., 61, of Bloomington, passed away on Thursday, March 21, 2019 at his residence. He was born on January 20, 1958 in Quantico, Virginia; the son of Charles Eldon Fleming, Sr. and Clyde Lucia (Blocker) Fleming.

Chuck joined the United States Army and was stationed in Germany where he was a Hawk Missile Crewmember for 15 years, followed by an Intel Assistant for six years. During his service, Chuck received numerous awards and medals for his service. He was honorably discharged as a Sergeant in November 1988. Chuck also worked for 27 years at Premier Tech Chronos before his retirement. His love of the outdoors, camping, and cooking was only outmatched by that of the love of his wife and children. Chuck loved blues music and played with his many friends in Griff Hamlin's Blues Guitar Unleashed. In addition, he had a deep appreciation for history.

Chuck is survived by his loving wife of thirty-seven years Gudrun "Gudi" Fleming and their three children, Stephanie (Joseph) Kern, Marcie (Joseph) Near, and son Robert (Stephanie) Fleming; grandchildren, Lena and Joseph Near, and one on the way; and step-mother, Cheryl Fleming. Chuck is also survived by his sister, Paula Fleming and sister-in-law, Hedwig Liebetanz-Theis.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his sisters, Cindy Fleming and Shelley Fleming and brother-in-law, Harald Theis.

We had had lots of meals in restaurants together and Chuck was very familiar with my habit of offering a silent prayer on my food before I ate. Well, this time, I had forgotten to say prayer, and Chuck realized that I had forgot, and as I raised my fork filled with food up to my mouth and partially inserted it, Chuck, with a big grin on his face said "Uh - uh -uh!" I don't know if he realized how close he came to wearing that fork full of food because I busted up laughing. I still get a good laugh, just thinking about that.

I enjoyed working with Chuck. In addition to his sense of humor, he was very proficient at what he did and he had a way of cutting through to the crux of the problem and coming up with a solution.

I mourn with you in your loss. The world has lost a really good guy. I will miss him.
