Forest R. Jacobs, age 93, died on Saturday, October 15th, at Bell Trace Health and Living Center in Bloomington, Indiana. He was born on April 8, 1923 in St. Marys, Ohio to John and Sarah Moser Jacobs, and was one of nine children. Forest graduated from The Ohio State University in 1949 with a degree in Electrical Engineering, and worked his entire career at Brown-Forman Distillers in Louisville, Kentucky.

His wife, Joan, died on October 7, 2012 and he is survived by his son Bob and wife Rhonda Lummus, residents of Vero Beach, Florida and Bloomington, Indiana. Also surviving are his sister Mary May, and brothers Paul and Jack. Forest is survived by two grandchildren Jennifer Edgington (husband Clint) of Columbus, Ohio and Suzy Jacobs, of Chicago. He has three great-grandsons; Cole, Conner and Grant Edgington.

Forest was preceded in death by his parents, his brother Jim, and sister, Virginia, and three brothers who died in childhood.
