



## Hana Benes Wilson

May 11, 1912 - December 9, 2012

Hana Benes Wilson, 100, died Sunday, December 9th, 2012, at the Meadowood Health Pavilion. She was born May 11th, 1912, at Ratbor, Czechoslovakia, the daughter of Olga and Ota Mandelik.

She spent her childhood and young adulthood in Prague. During World War II, she wrote and edited articles for Victory magazine and covered the founding of the United Nations--in San Francisco--as a journalist.

She was married to Vaclav Benes. They moved to Bloomington in 1950, where Vaclav taught Government and Hana later taught Czech and literature in the Slavic Department, at Indiana University.

After Vaclav's death, she married William E. Wilson, a distinguished professor in the English Department.

Hana is survived by two daughters: Eva Hanhardt and Nina Hajda, eight grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren, as well as a nephew, Peter Mandelik. She also had three step-sons, five step-grandchildren, and four step-great grandchildren.

A funeral Mass will be held Saturday, December 15th, at 10:30 a.m.
