September 2, 1938 - January 9, 2025

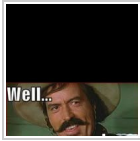

A celebration of life will be announced in the spring. Allen Funeral Home has been entrusted with the arrangements.

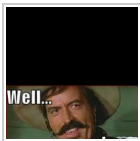
