I remember the first time she had me over to her house for dinner. About halfway through the meal, it became clear that I was terribly allergic to her cat. Judy couldn't stop apologizing, no matter how many times I reminded her that my allergies weren't her fault.

In the mid-1980s, we spent a long weekend with a bunch of friends on a houseboat. While most of the gang partied on the main deck, Judy and I camped out on the boat's roof, each poring over a thick book, stopping every hour or so to share and retell what we had just read. We both came away feeling like we'd read two books instead of one. Over the years, many of my memories of Judy are of her happily sitting in the sun, often wearing a wide-brimmed hat, enjoying a good book.

Once we both had children, our families vacationed every summer in Cape Cod. Judy's sons were several years older than my daughters, who always looked up to John and Adam. And all of us looked up to Judy as a parent. While always doting on Adam and John, she demonstrated not only her love for them, but her respect. From an early age, both of them were, rightly, a source of immense pride for Judy.

While Judy will be greatly missed, her spirit, and her indomitable kindness, live on today in her two amazing sons, Adam and John. All of us will miss Judy enormously.
