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“ I found, to my profound sadness, Kens Obit. I was not expecting it. We served under Captain Robert C. Onslow, 1/26 S-4, (Khe Sanh) where Sgt K was the logistics chief. He took me under his wing and taught me many things of my new job - but what he really taught me was to keep my spirits high and keep doing the best job possible under any circumstance. I was a few months older than Ken but even at 20 years old he was mature and responsible but led with a light hand. When I rotated back to the states in April 68 as a 21 year old corporal I still maintained the military decorum of saying good bye to Sgt Kasper. He extended his hand and said call me Ken. I was very proud of that.

Though I lost contact with Ken after that I have often thought of him and recently goodled him and found that he had passed. I feel the obligation to write and let you know how much he inspired me and made me a better Marine and man. God bless his family.
