Patricia Mary Gleeson, 75, passed away November 8, at Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis. She was surrounded by her entire family. She is survived by her husband of 52 years, Michael Gleeson, and four children – Megan Schy Gleeson, married to Jeffrey Schy Gleeson, Molly Gleeson, Catherine Gleeson, married to Ruben van Leeuwen and parents to grandchild Oscar van Leeuwen, and Thomas Gleeson. She is also survived by brothers Bernie Kalkbrenner and Dennis Kalkbrenner. Throughout her life, Pat directed over 200 plays, musicals, and other performances. She formed two children's theatres – Mount Vernon Community Children's Theatre in Alexandria, Virginia, and Acting Up in Bloomington, Indiana, taught and directed for the Powderhorn Players in Minneapolis, Minnesota and Bloomington High School North, and served as Executive Director for the Boston Children's Theatre and Stages Bloomington. She impacted the lives of thousands of children, some of whom have gone on to work in theatre or become parents of young actors today. Pat's passion for theatre and arts education, especially for children, was unsurpassed. Her family, her colleagues, and her young actors often heard her say, "All children are gifted and talented," and she believed that theatre was a way for children to find out what those talents were – even if those talents did not lie in theatre itself. She strongly believed in the benefits of arts education, as a way to understand history and the human condition. Pat's intention was to broaden the minds and enrich the lives of the children she worked with. For her, theatre was not just an after school activity. She

insisted on the professionalism and the discipline of the theatre. Loved and revered throughout her life, Pat Gleeson will be missed by many.

“ Mrs. Gleeson (I don't think I ever called her Pat to her face) taught me so many things during my years at the Boston Children's Theatre. She taught me the importance of dedication both onstage and off. It wasn't so important that you act well or sing well, but you had be present and focused in rehearsal, you had to respect your fellow actors, and you **absolutely** had to make your entrances on time, lest your lines for that scene be transferred to another actor who was actually paying attention.



*And for all the training I later received in college for things like the Stanislavsky method, I don't think any acting lesson will resonate with me more than "It doesn't matter if your pants fall down onstage, as long as you react to it **in-character!**"*

Mrs. Gleeson helped to foster a life-long love of the theatre in me, which persists to this day. When I think of my closest friends, the first faces that come to mind are the ones that stood beside me in productions of Big River and Oliver!, of Honk! and Peter Pan.

And even after BCT, she continued to influence my life. One of my college essays, about "a person who has had a major impact on your life," was about her. I majored in theatre, I stayed involved in community theatre after graduation, and the first conversation I ever had with my future wife was about musical theatre.

“ I can't imagine what my life would have been like without Mrs. Gleeson and *Acting Up*. The community she created, which allowed older and younger to work together on shows, was such a lifeline for me during years when I was going through hard times at school and at home. It gave me the opportunity to meet dear friends of my childhood and fostered in me a love of theater and the arts that has shaped my whole life.

*I remember with so much love and appreciation how seriously Mrs. Gleeson took us even when we were really young, always expecting us to have a pencil in hand to mark down our blocking; to be "off-book" and letter-perfect by a certain date; to be fully present in every scene and react to what others were doing onstage. She treated kids with so much respect and had such high expectations, and we loved her for that. How much time and energy and creativity she poured in, not only to the shows, and creative arts camp she ran, but also to stuff like the *Enchanted Forest*, which really was such an enchanting (and hilarious) experience for me, to be out in the woods late at night, feeling so independent and part of a tight-knit community working together and having fun.*

This may seem kind of trivial, but I also remember how much I loved her style: during that awful era of puffed sleeves and whatnot that was the 1980s, she always wore chinos and tucked-in an oxford shirt, and I thought she was so cool, in a tough broad, Katherine Hepburn/Humphrey Bogart kind of way. She was such a legend to me that, when I went over to play with Cate at the Gleeson house, I remember feeling weirded out to see her living a normal human life!

*Getting to play Rosie in *REALLY ROSIE* under her direction when I was 11 or 12 was, no kidding, the highlight of my life as a performer-which tells you something about how I did in my college B.F.A. musical theater program, but oh well! I love being a literary critic who writes about (and teaches) the history of theater, too! And anyway, what I value even more than the performance skills I learned from her was the sense of belonging she fostered, by*

showing us how much joy could be had by working hard together in a group toward a shared goal.

May her memory be a blessing to you, dear Gleasons, as it is to me and so many other kids who grew up enriched by the experience of knowing her.

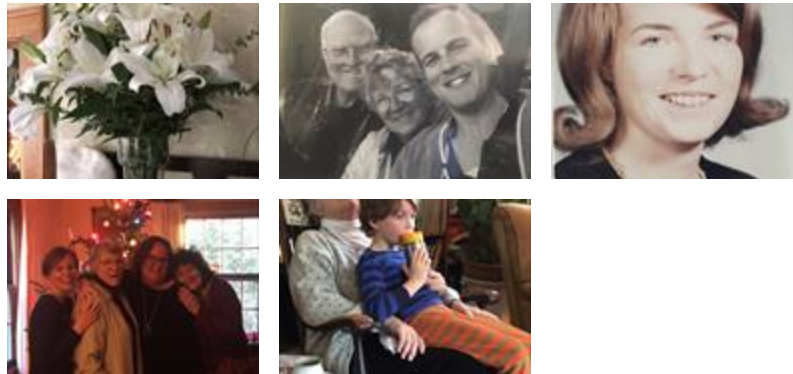

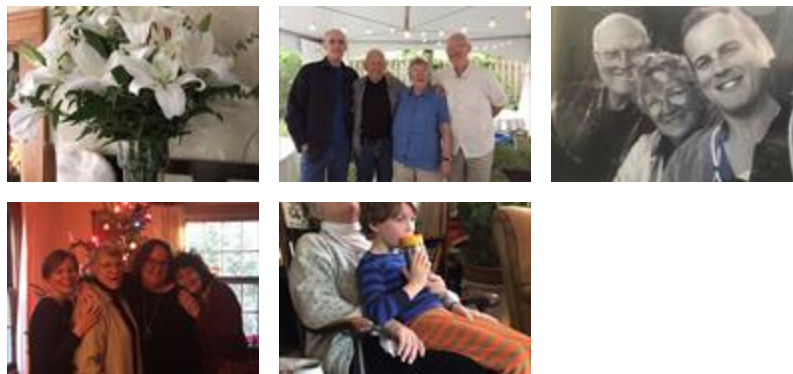
