



Peter Lindenbaum

November 4, 1938 - January 20, 2010

Peter Lindenbaum, of Bloomington and London, England, died at his Bloomington home on Wednesday, after a long battle with cancer. He was 71. Born in New York City, he was educated at Harvard College, the University of Cambridge, and the University of California at Berkeley. From 1967-2003, he taught at Indiana University, where he was a professor of English and a founder of the History of the Book and Renaissance Studies programs. His published work focused on the poet John Milton and, more recently, on writers' contracts and the construction of reading audiences in the seventeenth-century book trade, on which he wrote a series of seminal articles. He also had a special interest in modern libraries of rare books. At Indiana, he was active in faculty governance and the recruitment of graduate students, while always sustaining a deep commitment to undergraduate teaching. After retirement, he lived in London, where he enjoyed affiliations with the University of London at the Institute for English Studies and Royal Holloway College. In the course of his career, he held fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Gladys Krieble Delmas Foundation, the Folger Library, the Bibliographical Societies of Great Britain and America, and the Mellon Foundation. He is survived by his wife Sheila, his son John, his daughter-in-law Sarah Reed, and his parents-in-law Joseph and Wanda Serio. “ Dear Sheila:

I was deeply saddened to learn of Peter's passing. I had not seen him (or you) since his retirement, but I thought of him often.

Peter was the first IU English professor to teach in the London IES summer Program, a connection which I developed through Overseas Study in the early '90s; and he was extraordinary. In fact, it was Peter's outstanding teaching on that program, and his great energy and commitment in promoting it to IU students, that were the keys to its overwhelming success in subsequent years. We were so successful that we had to cap enrollments so that the program did not become simply an IU adjunct abroad, as IES wanted more diversity in its clientele. We had many excellent teachers in later years, but Peter set the standard and is, for me and others, the enduring image of that program.

I remember that it was only a few months before that London trip when Peter discovered his cancer; and he was anguished that he might not be able to travel. But his wonderful spirit and good treatment at that stage prevailed, and he was a star in London.

Peter was also a long time member of my Overseas Study Advisory Council, where I greatly valued his thoughtful and careful evaluations of new programs and policies

Finally, I remember a lovely retirement party at your house for Al and Linda David, to which I was quite honored to be invited and where I very much enjoyed talking with you and Peter.

My thoughts and condolences are with you at this difficult time, Sheila.
